KEVIN JOHNSON: God is faithful, even when people struggle

The last time I shared my story with you, it was 2014 and I was sober. having found a new life at the Rescue Mission.

When I graduated the recovery program I did well for guite a while. Yet, when I moved into a subsidized housing complex where there was a lot of drug use, I started slipping into my old ways. Eventually, I quit going to recovery meetings, began hanging out with the wrong people, and turned to drugs again. My drug abuse grew so bad that I ended up in the hospital with a serious infection that almost took my life.

I am not sure how, but I acquired Botulism Type A. It could've been from food, or it might have been from some tainted needles or drugs, but on Thanksgiving Day in 2016 I slumped over in a chair at my friend's house and didn't regain full consciousness for five days.

During those five days I was close to death. I recall having several out-of-body experiences, where it felt like I was hovering

above my body watching medical professionals work to keep me alive. I was on a hospital bed and recall people yelling things like "Code Blue" and "He's not going to make it." When I did regain consciousness, they told me they had received an antitoxin that they had to order from a military supply. Still, doctors said they couldn't guarantee I would survive.

But thanks to the foundation that God built in my life at the Rescue Mission, my life started to turn around again. Members of the church family I had connected with during my time at the Rescue Mission began showing up to pray for me. I'm not sure how they knew I was on my death bed at the hospital, but many faithful members of Calvary Baptist Church stopped by to pray. I felt blessed, grateful to have that prayer support network.

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GOD BRINGS THE SALT LAKE AND OGDEN RESCUE MISSIONS TOGETHER

This month, I want to share some Rescue Mission history. Mostly, I want to share how that history has come full circle to create an

exciting announcement about our future.



In the early 1970s a small group of Salt Lake-based Christian businessmen regularly drove from Salt Lake to Ogden to serve at the only Christ-centered homeless service provider in the State of Utah the Ogden Rescue Mission. On one trip, father and son Dan and Don Kramer, invited Kay Nakashima, a friend and fellow Christian businessmen to come along. On the return trip, Kay asked why they drove past all the homeless people in

the Salt Lake area to head north. Kay's question led to this small group of men, along with their families, to consider establishing a Rescue Mission in downtown Salt Lake City.

In 1972—after much prayer and second mortgages on four of our founders' homes—the Rescue Mission of Salt Lake was incorporated and began serving our homeless friends and neighbors. Our first location was just blocks away from the location of our current Homeless Service Center and Men's Recovery Program.

Since then, the Rescue Mission has developed services to meet the immediate needs of our homeless friends (food, shelter, clothing, and more). Additionally, we have created comprehensive, life-changing programs to provide a pathway off the streets through addiction recovery, Christian education, employment, housing, and restoration of relationships.

Over these many decades, the Mission successfully paid off the downtown Homeless Service Center's mortgage, opened the Rescue Mission Women's Center in 1984 a few blocks south of downtown, and thanks to generous donors has transitional housing complexes for both men and women who are moving off the streets.

But it wasn't until just recently that God brought the Rescue Mission story full circle. After years of friendship and collaboration, I am excited to announce that the Rescue Mission of Salt Lake has joined operations with the Ogden Rescue Mission. We have formed one organization under the umbrella of the Rescue Mission of Salt Lake that will care for Utah's most vulnerable populations all along the Wasatch Front and partnerships that reach out to most of the state of Utah.

This means the Rescue Mission now has five locations the Ogden homeless service center and shelter, the Salt Lake homeless service center and shelter, our Women's Center, and our two transitional housing homes.

In total we are serving just over 300 people nightly, with up to 90 men, women, and children participating in our New Life Programs. The formal merger came at the request of Ogden Rescue Mission Director Judy Doud and Ogden Rescue Mission Board of Directors. The Rescue Mission of Salt Lake Board of Directors excepted their request knowing that we were better together. Our purpose is the same to transform people's lives in the name of Jesus Christ. The Rescue Mission of Salt Lake will bring the experience of a more formalized addiction recovery program and executive/administrative experience to the combined organization.

One organization, yet two great names to serve our great communities. Our Ogden facility and operations will still be known as Ogden Rescue Mission serving the Ogden Valley and surrounding area. Rescue Mission of Salt Lake will continue to serve the Salt Lake Valley with outreach efforts to much of the state of Utah.

With this expansion of ministry, our goal remains the same as it was back in 1972: To love God with all our soul, to love our neighbors, and to help our homeless friends find faith and serve God with all their being. Through that faith we hope they will also discover a pathway off the streets and into sobriety, housing, and employment. Thank you for supporting us and helping the neediest members of our community find hope. Please pray for us as we integrate our two great organizations and staff teams into one.

The hospital eventually released me to hospice care, with doctors thinking I had suffered so much internal damage that I still might not survive. But those prayers worked and after a few weeks in hospice, my appetite returned. I was on a feeding tube but I kept telling my caregivers that I felt like I was starving. They brought in a dietitian who said that when a sick person's body starts healing, it needs extra calories to repair. My constant hunger was a good sign that God was healing the body I had broken. After a few weeks I was released from hospice.

With my life saved, I recalled what I had learned at the Rescue Mission and started stopping by to talk with the

staff more often, especially George Sproul and Pastor Chris. I remembered that it was connection with people, regular recovery meetings, and a relationship with God that would help me stay sober. So, I began recovery classes again, humbled by my recent downfall.

Through recovery, I came to realize that after I left the Rescue Mission, I lost what the Bible calls a sober or "sound" mind. I remembered 2 Timothy 1:7 which says, God has not given His people a spirit of fear, but a spirt of a sound mind. After I left the Rescue Mission, when I was not using drugs and was technically "sober", my mind became filled with the wrong things. Thoughts of fear, worry, and sin crept in. I no longer had a sober mind. It was only a matter of time before I started using again.

But getting back into recovery classes allow me to find that sound mind that God desires for His people. It's a peaceful mind that is not focused on fears, or money, or drugs, but on God's greatness and goodness.

Through this experience I learned I can never stop working on my recovery. I wanted to help others as so many had helped me. I was able to take some classes through Utah State University and became certified as a Peer Support Specialist, trained to help other people struggling with addiction stay clean and sober.

My new education and sober mind allowed me to start working again. I was blessed to secure a job at a recovery program called Odyssey House. I feel this is the place where God wants me. Many people come to Odyssey House for help with addiction and I believe I can support them. After all, I have experienced many of the same struggles they are going through and can relate to them. I can give them real-life advice.

It has been a blessing to find a job where I can help others. Through work, I have been able to secure an apartment in West Valley City near a TRAX station so I can ride public transportation to my job. I have also been able to clear up the legal charges I faced, related to that Thanksgiving Day in 2016 when I fell over an almost died.

I want to thank Rescue Mission and its supporters for allowing me to keep stopping by to check in and reaching out to me while I was in the hospital. It's a privilege to share my story for a second time. I hope that through my

story, you understand that people who graduate from the Rescue Mission can backslide. But, the foundation laid at the Rescue Mission is so strong, that it helps and saves backsliders. No Christian is perfect and no ex-addict who becomes a Christian will be perfect. Some will return to drugs at times. But based on the relationship they began with God at the Rescue Mission, God will call them back into sobriety and faithfulness. He will use his people to do it, just like He did for me. Thank you for being His people and for praying for and supporting people like me, who need your ongoing support.
