DAVID BENSLEY: Gaining sobriety, employment, and faith

At the beginning of 2022 I had been homeless (or in jail) for over three years. I had lost all hope. Today I am sober, have a job, and a relationship with Jesus, all because of the help I received at the Rescue Mission of Salt Lake.

I grew up in a gang in Los Angeles and sold and used meth when I was a teenager. It was a hard life, and I spent several years in jail and prison. I ended up in a maximum-security prison in Arizona. It was there that I developed faith in God and His son Jesus. I put my faith and trust in Jesus and when I was released from prison I moved to Las Vegas and did well.

My mother, whom I grew up with, also had given her life to Jesus and she encouraged me to stay sober and live for God. I got a job in sales, was married, moved into a house, bought a motorcycle, cars, and other nice things. I was active in the local Christian community and participated in outreach and ministry. I was sober for over 10 years and had a good life. One day, a "friend" pulled out some meth and suggested we do it together. I was working a lot of hours, staying up late, and thought, "why not just this once." That decision ruined my life. I spent the next several years abusing meth. I lost my marriage, my house, everything.

Destitute in Las Vegas, I needed a change, so I decided new scenery might be the ticket. I traveled to Salt Lake, but nothing changed except the city. For the next three years I was either homeless or in jail. I remember first meeting a Rescue Mission New Life Program member named Kurtis when I popped my head up out of the Rescue Mission's dumpster one

morning and scared him half to death.

But that was my life, scrounging for money to get drugs and rummaging through dumpsters for food or

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GOD WANTS TO SEE US BE BRAVE

The English word "bravery," is not necessarily found in the Bible. However,



God's Word encourages His people to have courage, stand strong, and not fear (e.g., 1 Corinthians 16:13, Deuteronomy 31:6; 2 Timothy 1:7). To me these charges are a call to be brave in the face of doubt, shame, and anxiety – not because of anything in ourselves, but because "the Lord Your God will be with

you wherever you go." Joshua 1:9.

Throughout each week, I have regular conversations with our program members, homeless friends, and the counselors on our New Life Recovery Program. Often, the Staff Team shares how impressed we all are with the bravery that God gives the men and women on our New Life Recovery Program.

Cassie Warner, one of our New Life Program counselors, recently recorded a "Minute at the Mission" Facebook post detailing the inspiring bravery she sees on a regular basis. Cassie shared that the men and women on the recovery program are the bravest people she has ever met in her life, "because they are addressing their life challenges, abuse, destructive family situations, physical pain, emotional pain, and other situations that have defined their life and who they are." With God's enabling grace and power, our New Life Program members bravely "confront those life-defining issues to be on the recovery program," Cassie said.

If you don't follow the Rescue Mission on Facebook, please follow us, so you can check out inspiring content like our Minute at the Mission videos that will encourage you as you hear testimonies of how God works at the Mission.

One example is David Bensley, who shares his life story in the Rescuer this month. David was born into a life of drug abuse and later incarceration, but God reached down and saved him, giving David 10 great years of sobriety, employment, and family life in the Las Vegas area. But David lost everything when he was reintroduced to meth by a "friend." Trying meth again led to several years of street life and eventually landed David in Salt Lake where he would regularly

scrounge through dumpsters to find the things he needed to survive.

After 10 years of victory and then falling so far again, it took bravery for David to ask the Mission for help. Then more God-enabled bravery helped him to confront his past mistakes and destructive behaviors. Through it all, David now understands that God can (and did!) restore even him.

Honestly talking through abuses and pains that have been committed against a person, or that a person may have committed against others, takes a lot of bravery. It also takes trust in the Rescue Mission and our Staff Team—trust that we are here to help them and not condemn. We are here to believe in people and help people become the men and women God intends them to be.

As you remember, please pray for our counselors and our New Life Program members as they engage in our life-changing counseling ministry. Pray that God would give all involved the bravery needed to find healing, shed shame, and gain new life in Jesus Christ. Pray for our homeless neighbors that they would have the bravery to ask for help—the real help they need change their lives. This brave work is the key to all we are trying to accomplish at the Rescue Mission and your support helps make it happen.

anything I could sell for money. To be honest, I had lost all my dignity. I gave up on my life. I had no hope. There was no light.

Later, I was arrested for trying to get money so I could buy drugs and subsequently was diagnosed with a type of schizophrenia that placed me into the Mental Health Court system. Homeless and needing to pass multiple drug tests each week or go back to jail, I urgently needed someplace that could help me stay sober and give me stability off the streets.

I was standing out in front of the Rescue Mission wondering what to do, when Kurtis, the New Life Program member I had once scared after popping out of the dumpster, stepped outside and asked me a question that would change my life, "Do you want to join the New Life Program here at the Rescue Mission?"

"Yes," I heard myself say.

Since that time, God has been restoring my hope and my faith. The first thing that helped me was the work therapy I did in the Mission's kitchen. I served the homeless men and women that come to the Mission for breakfast, lunch, and dinner. Working in the kitchen showed me how to help people again and removed my doubts that God could ever use me again or that He didn't want me.

Today I believe there is a better life for me, a better day ahead. Meeting with my counselor for these past nine months has helped me address many of the things that happened to me in my past and I have learned (at least to some degree) to let go of bitterness and pride.

The Bible studies and chapel services here at the Rescue Mission have also helped me to reestablish my relationship with God. While I felt hopeless, ashamed, and worthless, I never stopped believing in God. I just felt I had turned my back on Him in such a significant way that there was no way He could take me back. I know now that I was wrong and His forgiveness is real and deep. I am blessed to have a great support system of friends here at the Rescue Mission and a good church family at Calvary Chapel of Salt Lake.

When I moved to the employment phase of the New Life Program I was further blessed to get a job with Maverick Country Stores. It's a good job with benefits that will allow me to save up money so I can get into a place of my own when I graduate the New Life Program in about a month.

I have made good progress working through Mental

Health Court. When I first came to the Rescue Mission I had to go before the judge once a week and take two drug tests a week. Now, I only report once a month and while my initial sentence would keep me in Mental Health Court for another two years, my judge says I am doing so well that I could end my supervision a year early. I am also working with the doctor who supervises me to reduce the amount of medication I take for my schizophrenic disorder.

I honestly believe I am not schizophrenic, but that my symptoms and delusions were part of my years of meth use. Now that I am sober and connected with God, I do not believe that I need to be on medication anymore. Still, I am working with my doctor who is slowly reducing the amount of medication I take. I trust my doctor and God and when I am ready will accept whatever the right outcome is, whether I need to continue to be on medication or not.

I talk with my mom every day. She lives in Illinois and encourages me in my relationship with Jesus. I have two boys from a previous relationship that I am proud of as well. They both live in Dallas with their mother and are doing well, one is in sales and the other just finishing school. It is great to be reconnected with my boys.

I want to thank everyone who supports the Rescue Mission. When I work at Maverick, I can smile at my customers. I go to work happy each day that I have a job and can support myself again. Thank you for supporting this ministry that literally dug me out of their own dumpster, welcomed me in, and helped change my life.
